# **Beware of Scams- Protecting Your Home**

Dear Residents,

Lately, there has been a disturbing trend of fraudulent companies targeting individuals who are behind on property taxes or facing the threat of foreclosure. These companies prey on vulnerable homeowners, promising relief but delivering only further financial suffering and possible loss.

It's important to exercise caution and skepticism if you're approached by companies offering assistance with your property tax or foreclosure issues. Many of these companies operate with the sole intention of scamming homeowners out of their homes and hard-earned money. It's crucial for all of us in Roosevelt Park to be aware of these scams and take proactive measures to protect our homes and our financial well-being. If you find yourself in a situation where you're struggling with property taxes or foreclosure, please know that there are legitimate avenues for assistance.

The Muskegon County Treasurer's office, reachable at (231)724-6261, can offer support and guidance to help you explore options to prevent tax foreclosure and find a way forward that works for you.

If you've already been contacted by such companies, please contact our police department or a trusted legal advisor before making any commitments. Understanding the potential consequences and verifying the legitimacy of these offers can save you from falling victim to fraud and protect the ownership of your home.

Together, let's remain vigilant and informed, ensuring that we don't become victims of deceptive practices. By knowing our options and seeking assistance from trusted sources like the Roosevelt Park Police Department, the Muskegon County Treasurer's office and legal advisors, we can protect our homes and our community from fraud.

## **Brush Pickup Reminder**

When preparing brush for pickup on Mondays, remember that we do not collect trees or bushes with root balls attached. Homeowners are responsible for disposing of root balls. Also, please refrain from dumping piles of grass clippings, leaves, or any other debris on brush piles. To ensure efficient pickup, keep brush lengths at 8 feet or smaller and neatly stack them with all ends facing the road.

# Pointers from the RPPD

#### TRAFFIC SAFETY

The Roosevelt Park Police Department is committed to ensuring the safety of the citizens in our community. Impairment, speeding, disregarding traffic control devices, and other dangerous driving behaviors jeopardize the safety of other people on the road. We continue to enforce traffic laws with the goal of reducing collisions, educating the citizens in our community, and keeping our community safe. This is achieved through the establishment of preventative patrols to manage specific categories of unlawful driving behavior.

Traffic enforcement strategies are based on collision data, enforcement activity records, traffic volume, and traffic conditions. Several methods contribute to our overall goal: arrests, citations, warnings, and education. Through these methods and efforts, we strive to educate our community on the importance of safe driving and we aim to keep our community safe.



**Bicycle Safety** remains a key concern and top priority in our community year-round. It is the goal of the Roosevelt Park Police Department to reduce the number of collisions, injuries and deaths involving bicyclists by providing education and increasing enforcement to help safeguard everyone on the road.

The Roosevelt Park Police Department aims to remind bicycle riders to follow the same rules of the road as drivers, including stopping at stop signs, yielding to

pedestrians, and not riding distracted or under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Drivers should remain vigilant in looking out for bicyclists, and remember, Michigan law requires drivers to allow at least three feet of space when passing a bicycle on the road.

To help keep bicyclists safe on our roadways, the Roosevelt Park Police Department has the following reminders:

- ♦ Bike riders should always wear a helmet.
- When cycling, use hand signals for turning and stopping.
- Drivers should look behind them before making a turn at an intersection, changing lanes, pulling away from a curb, opening their door, or when reversing or leaving a parking space.
- Bicyclists should always ride in the same direction as traffic.
- Bicyclists should make themselves visible by wearing brightly colored clothing, and reflective clothing in low light conditions.
- Bicyclists are reminded to use lights from dusk to dawn (white light to the front; red flashing light or reflectors to the rear). Both drivers and bicyclists should avoid distractions like using their cell phone.

# LERK'S CORNER

The ABSENTEE BALLOT REQUEST FORM will be discontinued by the State of Michigan after 2024. If you are not on the PERMANENT ABSENTEE BALLOT LIST already, you will be receiving one more request form in the mail soon. Check the box and return the form to be placed on the permanent absentee ballot list. Those on the permanent list will automatically be issued an absentee ballot for all future elections. Anyone not on the list will need to request an absentee ballot if they want one in the future.

A few residents have asked me some elections questions lately that I want to help clarify. Voters must do their own research on election subjects. This includes up-coming ballot proposals and what they are all about, as well as candidates running for office including our own City Council. Neither City Hall employees nor the City Clerk, can advise you on candidates or ballot proposals. Write-ins seem to be a confusing topic as well. For a write-in vote to be valid and counted, the candidate must have filed a declaration of intent to be a write-in with the County on or before 4 pm the Friday preceding the election. I agree in most cases there does not seem to be enough information out there. If you watch the local paper, call your county clerk's office 231-724-6425 or go to Michigan.gov/sos/elections/voter-education, these resources should help.

Mark your calendars, we have two elections coming up. The Primary on Tuesday August 6th and the General election on Tuesday November 5th.

There have never been more ways a resident can vote:

### 1. Absentee voting

Previously a voter needed a documented reason why they could not make it to the polls on election day, now every voter can choose vote from their living room couch!

#### 2. Early in-person voting

Early in-person voting starts 9 days prior to an election. However, this is only mandatory for certain elections. Contact the clerk, or click the link above for more information on if this option is available and where it is taking place.

#### 3. At the polls on election day

Tried and true, you can come in person, on the day of the election from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm at the Roosevelt Park Community Center and cast your ballot.

Summer taxes consist of State Education Tax, Muskegon Area Intermediate School District Tax, Mona Shores School Tax and Muskegon County Operating Tax.

Inflationary increases are being felt everywhere, and it is no different for cities. Water provided to the City of Roosevelt Park is purchased from the City of Muskegon. Muskegon has notified us their rates are increasing on June 1st which means the next water bill you receive around September 1st will include that rate increase flow through.

# **ASSESSING FAQS**

#### **Uncapping Residential Property Taxes.**

In 1994, Michigan Voters passed Proposal A, which limits the growth in property taxes to the rate of inflation or 5%, whichever is less, but only until ownership of the property is transferred. Once ownership is transferred, the property's taxable value is uncapped and increases to the same level as the assessed value in the year following the sale. In most cases, buyers will see a substantial increase in property taxes depending on the gap between the taxable value and the assessed value of the property.

The formula under Proposal A ensures a property's taxable value does not grow as fast as the property's assessed value, which should be at or near 50% of market value. However, once the property is sold, the taxable value is uncapped and increases to the assessed value for the year following the sale.

For example, a new home is purchased for \$200,000 (market value). The assessed value is \$100,000 (50% of market value) and the previous taxable value was \$75,000. The gap between the assessed value and the taxable value depends on how long someone has owned the property. Once a purchase happens, the taxable value rises to match the assessed value and thus the "uncapping" of the taxable value occurs. For the following years of ownership, the taxable value again falls under the rate of inflation or 5% cap.
